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Business Law (BLAW-435) Winter 2024

Course Description:

- 1. **Honor Code**. Applies to all aspects of the class.
- 2. <u>Attendance.</u> Attendance will be taken at the start of each class via the aPlus+ attendance tool. If you find that you will miss a class (e.g. medical or family issues, recruiting-related, etc.) or that you would need to arrive late or leave early to a class, please email me in advance. If you find that you need to miss more than three class sessions, then see me before or at the first class session. Missing more than three class sessions would be undesirable for a variety of reasons, not the least of which is that it would be difficult to recreate the class experience for that number of class sessions.
- 3. <u>Electronic Devices and Other Technology.</u> Electronic devices and other technology are permitted only in connection with note taking or referencing course work during class. Recording of the class is not permitted without the express permission of the instructor and/or the guest lecturer (*See below*).
- 4. <u>Office Hours.</u> I am available by email (james.herbison@kellogg.northwestern.edu or jherbison@winston.com), phone (312-558-5909) and/or by appointment. Please feel free to make an appointment to discuss anything related to the course.
- 5. **Grading.** The final examination is modified open book (e.g., the use of class textbook, class notes and lecture materials are permitted) and is comprised of six essay questions, which constitute 70% of your grade. While times and dates for taking the exam will be subject to scheduling, the format of the exam will not be changed. Much time will be spent over the quarter in class discussing and preparing for the exam. Practice exams will be available on Canvas, and I am available to critique draft answers.
- 6. <u>Assignments.</u> As part of each week's lesson, there are posted questions on Canvas to be answered prior to the start of that week's class. My grading of those responses will account for the other 30% of your final grade. In addition, materials will occasionally be posted on Canvas throughout the quarter on subjects that we have covered or relevant to an upcoming class session, and we will use these fact patterns for class discussion.
- 7. **Student Liaison.** I will ask for a volunteer(s) to assume this role after the first class.

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- 8. <u>Class participation.</u> While individual class participation is not being recorded, students will be expected to have reviewed the course materials for the week and be prepared to discuss in class. We will resort to cold calling if I find that the class generally is not sufficiently prepared to discuss materials for that week's class.
- 9. <u>Course Materials/Textbook.</u> Students are expected to obtain the 10th Edition of the Cheeseman Business Law textbook (Pearson Education) for the class. Each session of the class will have required readings from chapters in this text, and from time to time various materials posted on Canvas throughout the quarter.
- 10. <u>Global Reach.</u> We will attempt to address global legal issues and germane hot topics abroad where possible throughout the quarter as well as addressing specific legal issues and differences varying by country relevant to global business operations.
- 11. <u>Overall description of the course.</u> Each session we will address a different substantive area of business law (the first class is an overview and introductory session) as outlined in the syllabus and as set forth in the required readings for each week in the text. The class will feature a few selected guest speakers to enhance the materials in the text.
- 12. <u>Significance of the class.</u> Whether you will be engaging in brand management, consulting, private equity, investment banking, a start-up or many other fields of endeavor, commercial laws (e.g. contracts, torts, business organizations, etc.) pervade and provide the legal framework for conducting business in the United States. In addition, since certain types of conduct may have criminal implications, we will highlight those laws that should be at the top of any businessperson's list of "need to know" laws. Finally, our analysis of these commercial legal issues will be from both an offensive and defensive perspective in order to provide you the tools to obtain and maintain a competitive advantage in your business.
